Instructions for Peer Feedback

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Please use my guidelines for papers (Santucci 2023) to answer the following two questions. What grade do you think Prof. Santucci would give to the paper you are reviewing? Why do you think it would get that grade?

In other words, pretend you are the professor. Your job is to give a grade *and explain* why you gave it. Remember that you are doing this to *help* a fellow person.

Please write your answer in a single paragraph. The paragraph should be about 100 words and definitely not longer than 250.

All of the guidelines are important. However, because you may not be familiar with them, I want to press the importance of five principles:

- 1. Having a clear thesis statement,
- 2. Having a title that suggests the paper's point,
- 3. Structuring paragraphs and topic sentences in a readable and logical way,
- 4. Incorporating relevant course concepts and defining them in ways that are faithful to the people who wrote/said them,
- 5. Doing the things above in a way that answers the question in the prompt.

Also, if the paper contains technical errors (grammar, capitalization, etc), please mark those errors on the paper you are reviewing. If the errors are repeated, you probably can stop marking them.
